

- HOME-ARP update
- New and renewing state funing opportunities (Prop. 123, DOLA, etc)

WHAT WE ARE FACING



• Low income residents cannot find affordable housing:

\$1,468 - Average apartment rent in the first quarter \$480,000 - Median home price 5,000+ calls to Brothers' Colorado Housing Connects for rental assistance alone

- Inflation has means families have to spend \$700/month more for the same expenses.
- Child care cliff
 September 30 was the end of federal emergency funding for child care facilities, and the Child Tax Credit ended this year.
- Family Shelter Shortage

- 1. Family Shelter
- 2. Proposition 123 Commitment: 860 Units
- 3. Anti-displacement
- 4. Senior Center
